Bosque School Wildlife Biology & Conservation students presented a variety of bosque research projects (see page 2 – Black Institute) and Akilah Sanders-Reed, advocated for Jane Goodall's Roots & Shoots program and 350.org, a global movement to solve the climate crisis.



Bosque Research through the Black Institute By: BEMP Co-Director Dan Shaw

Six Bosque School seniors presented scientific papers in Phoenix, AZ at the Joint Annual Meeting of the New Mexico and Arizona Chapters of the American Fisheries and Wildlife Societies in February. The presentations were a culmination of several months of field research on wildlife projects in the bosque and upland areas. Sydney Dazzo and Abbey Anderson (top photo, class of 2012) research consisted of documenting the presence of mid-size predators in the bosque using 16 track plates at 4 different locations. Lauren Bennett and Drea Meyer (middle photo, class of 2012) documented the opportunities and impediments within the west-side arroyo that wildlife face as they use the storm channels to move between Petroglyph National Monument and the bosque. Max Gibblin and Miles Loftin (bottom photo, class of 2012) completed a comprehensive survey of the Rio Grande through Bernalillo County to document the presence and intensity of feeding activity of beaver. The six students engaged in substantive discussions with wildlife professionals as they presented their findings and recommendations. The students were the only high school students present at the conference and directly competed with both upper level undergraduate and graduate students from universities across the southwest.

Educators work together on Project Wet curriculum at a Bosque School Workshop on Saturday, February 11th.

This past February teachers and environmental educators from across the state attended a Project WET workshop held at Bosque School. The workshop was hosted by Albuquerque Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority and BEMP. This FREE hands-on experience included a nature walk through the bosque, a riverside picnic lunch and a guest appearance by Gavilan the red-tailed hawk. During the workshop participants experimented with several curriculum guide activities including "One for All" which required the group to transport their "limited resource" through an obstacle course of pollutants, habitat destruction and drought. After completion of the one day workshop teachers each went home with the NEW color edition of the Project WET Curriculum and Activity Guide 2.0!

Many thanks to all 40+ of the teachers and educators who participated in February's workshop making it an overwhelming success!


BEMP Student Congress events coming soon... Thurs. April 26th & Fri. April 27th
